

MARITIME EDUCATION | SUMMER PROGRAMMING

We're sailing through an exciting season of learning and impact! Maritime education remains a steadfast, learning-by-doing anchor of Living Classrooms Foundation's mission.

Here's a snapshot of some achievements:

- Schools & Groups Collaboration: We've partnered with 65 unique schools and groups. 45% of these collaborations are with Title 1 schools, reinforcing our commitment to equity and access.
- Student Engagement: This season has been bustling with activity as we've engaged 2,064 eager learners.
- Programs Conducted: 126 programs already unfurled and were navigating towards our usual benchmark of at least 200 programs per season.
- Total Participation: Our engagement compass points in a positive direction, with 2,965 participants on board our ships, like Mildred Belle and our Skipjack, the Sigsbee. We're charting a course toward our 2023 goal of 4,800 participants!

A special shout-out to Baltimore City - our beacon this season, engaging 854 children. We've also cast our nets to regions like DC, Philadelphia, New York State, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and counties across Maryland.

With the winds of change at our backs and your invaluable support, we're excited to set sail for the remainder of this season. Let's continue making waves together!





MARITIME EDUCATION SEASONAL HIGHLIGHTS





MARITIME EDUCATION | SUMMER PROGRAMMING

This summer was spectacular for the Sigsbee ship and its dedicated crew. Together, they embarked on numerous voyages, positively impacting our community.

The season began with a memorable voyage involving the 8th-grade students from the Washington D.C. region. Over six days, they sailed to the Horn Point Oyster Hatchery in Cambridge, MD. Here, they actively constructed oyster cages, maintained oyster brooding tanks, and gained insights into Maryland's vital oyster recovery efforts.

But the early summer excitement didn't stop there. By the end of June, the Sigsbee had also hosted Boy Scouts Troop 601B for a 2-day immersive experience, introducing them to the art of seamanship and the wonders of life at sea.

Our ship's commitment to community collaboration was evident in its work with five in-house Living Classrooms programs this summer: Fresh Start, Crossroads/BUGS Summer Camp, POWER House, UA House, and a unique sailing experience for the Paddle Boats staff. Further strengthening community ties, Sigsbee proudly collaborated with several organizations and initiatives like I am Mentality, Bridges Baltimore, City Springs from our Target Investment Zone, St. Ignatius' 7th graders, and the heartwarming Casey Cares initiative.

The community outreach continued, with Sigsbee playing a pivotal role during the Latino Conservation Day at Masonville Cove. Here, nearly 100 participants came aboard to explore Baltimore's historical lineage and the enchanting ecology of the Patapsco River.

Another noteworthy event was the Tides and Vibes community gathering, where residents of the Baltimore Peninsula were introduced to the river's history and ecosystem.

In collaboration with Waterfront Partnership, we supported 40 Baltimore youth workers during the Blueway press conference with the Mayor, ending the day with an exhilarating kayaking session led by the Baltimore City Recreation and Parks Department.

In reflection, Sigsbee's summer was a harmonious blend of learning, community partnership, and celebration, truly embodying the spirit of the Living Classrooms Foundation.

This summer, Maritime Education sailed into vibrant new horizons! Especially on the decks of the Sigsbee and Mildred Belle, the latter making waves in Washington, D.C., for three exhilarating weeks in July. From dynamic ESTEM sessions and professional development workshops to intriguing charter programs, Mildred Belle was a hive of activity.

A captivating 3-day maritime journey from July 17-19! We embarked on an unforgettable adventure with a spirited crew of 7 young explorers who were strangers at the outset but a cohesive crew by the program's end. With the intertwining Anacostia and Potomac Rivers, our destination was the scenic Piscataway Park and Alice Ferguson Foundation's Hard Bargain Farm.

Onboard, the days were brimming with discovery . The kids delved into local wildlife through trawl fishing while also trying their hands (and mastering the art!) at steering the vessel. And what's an adventure without a bit of camping? We pitched our tents with many partners, getting creative with painting on retired sails, breaking the ice with entertaining games, and cherishing those cozy moments around a campfire with delicious s'mores . Each day unveiled new marine organisms and fresh land-based wonders to marvel at!

THE UA HOUSE AT FAYETTE



Operated by the Living Classrooms Foundation, the UA House at Fayette is a cornerstone of the Baltimore Target Investment Zone. Living Classrooms' Baltimore Target Investment Zone (TIZ) is our strategy to disrupt generational poverty in East Baltimore. Serving areas like the Fayette Street corridor, Perkins Homes, and nearby neighborhoods, our TIZ touches over 40,000 residents within 2.5 square miles. We run four Community Hubs: the UA House at Fayette, Broadway Overlook Center, POWER House in Perkins Homes, and Park House in Patterson Park, offering free education, workforce development, and health programs.

Daily, UA House welcomes over a hundred students, providing a rich blend of academic enrichment, health, physical education, and career guidance for our students. Additionally, adults find a haven here, with services ranging from workforce development to educational support.

Summer Highlights at the UA House: Over six dynamic weeks, it wasn't just about keeping our students occupied but about embarking on a <u>transformative journey</u>.

- Diverse Enrichments: Every day was a chance to delve deeper into chosen fields. Whether students chose art, music, dance, or technology, they enthusiastically dedicated themselves.
- Sailing & Oysters: The magic of sailing became a reality for our older students, coupled with an educational dive into oysters.
- Culinary Adventures: With guidance from the American Heart Association, campers explored and mastered recipes for healthier meals and snacks.
- Unity in the Community: In partnership with Better Tomorrows Org, the National Night Out event became a canvas for our artistic students. The theme, "Unity in the Community," was brought to life through their expressive artworks.
- Engaging Field Trips: Each week culminated in an awaited Friday field trip. Activities varied from spirited Nerf battles at Wonderfly, sailing on the Sigsbee, to immersive sessions on the game truck.
- Workforce Development: UA House's first floor is a dedicated workforce development center that supported 50+ adults this summer with several customized job training programs.





PATTERSON PARK HOUSE COMMUNITY CENTER

In collaboration with Harlem Lacrosse, Park House buzzed with energy this summer as Patterson Park and UTZ Field hosted a 5-week camp. From lacrosse to basketball and even baseball, our young participants, averaging 145 students, were immersed in diverse athletic experiences. Not just a center for fun, Park House also stands strong in our partnership with Patterson Park Audubon as a haven, ready to support in any emergency.

A collaboration to celebrate! With partners like Southeast Youth Collaborative, Harlem Lacrosse, Youthworks, and the Department of Recreation and Parks, we provided employment opportunities for young minds. These young talents played pivotal roles in orchestrating our summer camps and sports clinics, bringing joy and education to many through music, art, sports, and even cooking classes. The result? An impressive 72 paid interns through Youthworks and the MOED staff at our various sites this summer.

Our dedication to community wellness was at its peak this summer. We ventured out with our partners from GBMC/Gilchrist, knocking on doors, engaging residents, and hosting pop-ups to spread awareness on essential health check-ups and services.

Rehab on the Horizon: The Car Barn Project:

We've been actively working with Historic Jonestown, Albermarle Square Tenant Council, and the Cross Street Partners team on the much-anticipated Car Barn project in our continuous efforts to rejuvenate and celebrate Baltimore's heritage.

We're thrilled to announce a great partnership with Cross Street Partners, a Land Disposition Agreement for the Car Barn property, a future home for Workforce Development Programming. And for those who've been eyeing the building, yes, rehabilitation is on its way!

THE COMMUNITY'S POWER HOUSE

The building that is now the community's POWER House center, which originally opened on July 8, 1910, as a firehouse, operating as Engine Company 34. It housed the horse-drawn LaFrance Steam Engine, one of the oldest fire engines in the United States. The horse stables can still be seen on the lower level of the POWER House.

At Living Classrooms, POWER is an acronym for Providing Opportunities to Work, Expand, and Rise. Our community's POWER House is dedicated to year-round out-of-school-time programming and services to hundreds of families in five core areas: Education and Career Development, Character and Civic Development, Health and Life Skills, The Arts and Cultural Enrichment, and Health and Wellness. In addition, the POWER House offers financial literacy, English as a Second Language, GED preparatory classes, and job training courses for adults weekly.

This Summer, imagine a place where students not only had a blast but also delved into diverse activities. They danced, dabbled in art, took on STEM challenges, and even hosted a performance with a special touch from our alums, Braziah Murphy. And it wasn't just fun and games; they embraced healthy habits, understanding the essence of nutrition and staying active.

Special shoutout to our intern, Gerrod, for making learning about the food pyramid so engaging. And who could forget those boating adventures? The kids got a natural feel for the water, from paddle boats to sailboats. The summer ended with a joyous day at Greenbrier State Park, with families laughing, sharing, and making memories. What a summer to remember!

GEM (GIRLS EMPOWERMENT MISSION) PROGRAM

This summer, a group of 12 GEM girls and their leaders again experienced a unique summer program called WILD (Wilderness Individual Leadership & Development).

Thanks to a grant from the National Recreation Foundation and a partnership with Steve Schuler, these girls participated in a unique week-long outdoor recreation program in Torrey, Utah.

From June 24 to July 2, WILD exposed GEM girls and leaders to dramatically new environments, cultures, activities, higher education, and career possibilities.

The program was fortunate to receive generous hiking boots and socks donations from REI.

In the 2022 - 2023 school year, GEM served 38 female students from low-income homes (27 African American students, 3 Caucasian students, 5 Latinx students, and 3 Asian students) that attend Chesapeake High School (CHS), plus a group of 165 GEM alumnae (girls who have graduated from CHS and are currently in college or other continuing education.). The newest group in GEM is the Peridots (Class of 2026).

Over 92% of this GEM group are young women of color, 63% of the girls come from a single-parent home, and more than 75% receive free or reduced lunch based on federal guidelines.

GEM (Girls empowerment mission) is a program to empower high school girls from underserved communities by providing opportunities and growth experiences that will enable them to become independent, self-sufficient, and confident young women.

Masonville Cove Environmental Education Campus: BEES

SUMMER PROGRAMMING

Masonville Cove, Urban Wildlife Refuge Partnership (The Port of Baltimore, Living Classrooms Foundation, the National Aquarium, and Maryland Environmental Service) is a leader in urban conservation, known for superior educational programs and as a community asset and recreation destination where everyone has equal opportunity to benefit from meaningful outdoor and stewardship experiences.

Masonville Cove was buzzing this summer, and it wasn't just the bees! * Living Classrooms rolled out the ultimate 4-week adventure with BEES (Baltimore Environmental Education Superheroes) for 40+ spirited young minds of Maree G. Farring Elementary Middle School. Think: Kids turning into mini-hydrologists, biologists, and engineers by day and heroes of their own academic stories by night.

BEES students triumphed over summer learning loss. 100% of program participants who regularly attended BEES increased their reading proficiency by at least 1 level according to the Fountas and Pinnell assessment, and 17% who attended BEES periodically increased by more than 1 level on the Fountas and Pinnell assessment.

Our students set personal and academic goals while at BEES. 100% of students completed milestones towards achieving their goals during the program. Completed milestones included independent reading for 10 minutes a day, using sight word flash cards, and multiplication practice.

Dive into a day with our BEES: Mornings drenched in hands-on science lessons, enriched with dashes of literacy and hearty spoonfuls of social-emotional learning (SEL). These super kids met and soared past their personal goals through this magic mix, with every student leveling up their reading game!

The cherry on top? Electrifying enrichment sessions! They teamed up with CoreShark H2O, diving deep into the wonders of the Chesapeake Bay, and with NatureWoRx, taking therapeutic trails into nature's embrace.

KINGMAN ISLAND + HERITAGE ISLANDS | NATIONAL CAPITAL REGION

SUMMER PROGRAMMING

Kingman + Heritage Islands, located next to RFK stadium, are the District of Columbia Department of Energy and Environment (DOEE) property. Living Classrooms of the National Capital Region manage the islands,

Our vibrant park team consists of 5 Junior Rangers from local high schools, 4 Kingman Rangers steered by the Ranger Manager, two skilled Seasonal Rangers, and 59 youths from the GZEP MBSYEP.

This summer, over 130 students explored activities such as:

- Birdwatching with Dan Rauch from DOEE.
- Wetlands Exploration by Tess Danielson and Jen Dietzen.
- Water Quality Assessment with Brian Rodgers and Chesapeake Bay Landscape Students.
- An Anacostia River boat tour with Trey Sherard.
- Plant and Tree Workshop by Samuel Nelson from Casey Trees.
- Kayaking led by Adrianne Burke (Adrianne Burke is an employee of DPR, Department of Parks and Recreation) and Alex Wisbiski.
- Golf Course Management by Andrew Szunyog.
- The Angling and Fish surveys were led by LC-NCR staff (Education Ranger Lynn Coffee and Director of Kingman Island John Turvey)
- Financial literacy with Karida Green and Ahmari Thomas from Living Classrooms.
- Building projects supervised by the Kingman Island Ranger staff.

From June 26th to August 4th, our Junior Rangers immersed themselves in environmental and professional experiences at Kingman Island and LCF's Historic James C. Dent House.

This enriching program was backed by the Marion Barry Summer Youth Employment Program and a Department of Energy and Environment grant.

National Capital Region Langston Golf Tournament & New Partnership

Langston Golf Course is located on Benning Road in Northeast D.C., at the end of the D.C. Street Car Line. This historic 18-Hole course was named after John Mercer Langston, the first African American elected into public office. The facility is a celebrated beacon of African American golf heritage.

"In 2013, Langston golf was inducted into the National Black Golf Hall of Fame because 'it stands as the enduring symbol of the struggle to find equality in golf for black Americans."





On July 21, Kingman Island welcomed 26 attendees from Langston's Golf Course's Jack Vardaman Workforce Development Program (SYEP).

Under the guidance of the Kingman Island Jr Rangers, the group delved into the history and ecological challenges of the Anacostia Watershed. Their hands-on experiences included fishing to identify Anacostia River's aquatic species and kayaking on the Anacostia River Green Boats to assess trash in the Kingman Lake wetlands. Post activities, they gathered for lunch at the historic Langston Golf Course Clubhouse.

A subsequent visit on August 3 saw our Jr Rangers touring the Langston Golf Course with Andrew Szunyog from the National Links Trust. He enlightened them about the ecological considerations of golf course management, shed light on Langston's environmental restoration, and offered a practical putting lesson.

Our work is about empowering youth to become sustainable adults.

Fresh Start is a national model program of the US Department of Labor. It has provided vocational, academic, and social skills development training services to out-of-school youth ages 16-19 since 1989.

The Fresh Start program exemplifies how Living Classrooms teaches marketable job skills. The U.S. Department of Labor and the National Youth Employment Coalition continue recognizing Living Classrooms' Fresh Start program for "best practices working with opportunity youth" and embodying a "continuous improvement process."

We can assist youth with reducing barriers and obstacles that may advance them into sustainable wage occupations, earning their high school diploma, and obtaining industry-recognized credentials.

As we reflect on our journey and look forward to chronicling our endeavors, our hearts swell with gratitude. We offer our most profound appreciation to our community, families, friends, supporters, and tireless teammates who made this summer unforgettable. Join us as we celebrate our collective stories of change, collaboration, and aspiration.

July 7

Operation Respond staff assisted the statewide efforts in response to the horrific mass shooting in the Brooklyn Park neighborhood in South Baltimore.

Operation Respond worked alongside first responders and other critical state and local agencies in reaching out to residents and educating them about the resources available to help them heal from the trauma stemming from the tragedy.

July 19

Operation Respond hosted a community engagement activity in the Belair Edison community to educate the residents on our services and introduce them to our partners who work with us to meet the needs of our residents.

August 2

Operation Respond partnered with the Belair-Edison Community for the National Night Out.



Operation Respond is a dedicated Crisis Management Intervention Team (CMIT) that comprises trained Resource Navigators supported by a Licensed Clinical Social Worker, along with Career and Workforce Development Case Managers.

Our mission is to provide comprehensive services through our mobile Crisis Response Resource Center, focusing on responding to the needs of individuals and families in the Belair Edison and McElderry Park communities. Our holistic approach aims to empower those at the highest risk of community gun violence, helping them heal from unresolved trauma and transform their lives for the better.



Project Serve

SUMMER WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

Project SERVE (Service, Empowerment, Revitalization, Validation, Employment training) addresses high recidivism rates and barriers to meaningful employment among returning citizens in Baltimore City.

While still incarcerated, participants begin to learn about Project SERVE and, once released, are employed as SERVE members for 4 to 6 months, where they are provided with on-the-job training and rapid attachment to work, all leading to sustainable living-wage employment.

Living Classrooms Foundation Project SERVE has recently partnered with the Baltimore Tree Trust (BTT), launching a tree maintenance crew learning skills in urban forestry. Impressively, the BTT crew has maintained over 600 trees across three areas: 80 in Park Heights, 250 in Southwest Baltimore, and they're presently tending to 300 trees in Broadway East Community.

In tandem, our Project SERVE Neighborhood Stabilization crew has cleaned up 2,230 properties this year. This includes Project SERVE crews working across the city cleaning vacant lots, green spaces, sidewalks, and alleyways, emptying street cans, and collectively removing 1.15 tons of trash this year.
